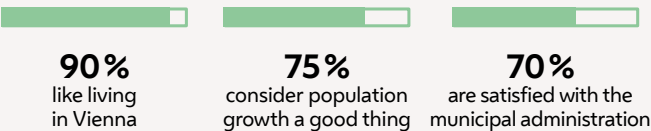

Foreword

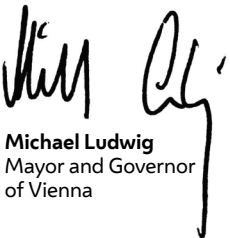
Dear readers,

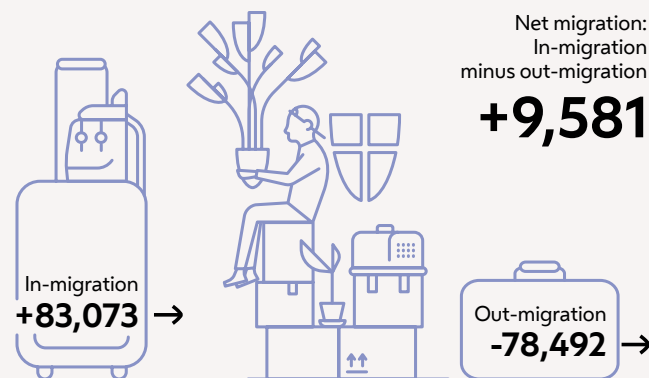

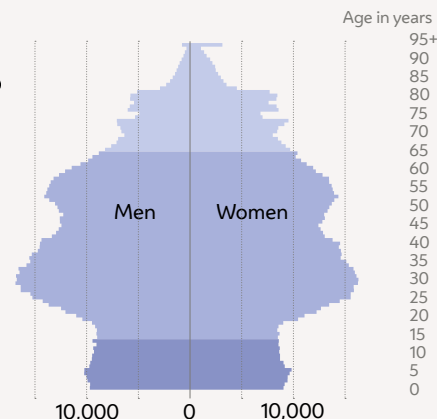

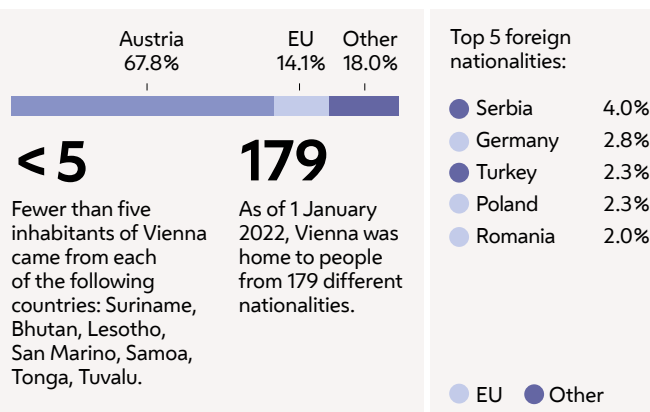

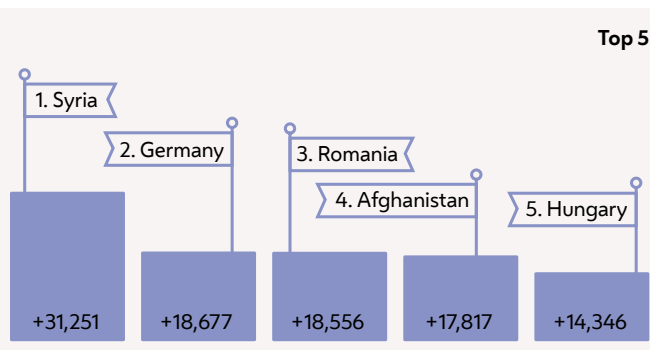
Population by nationality

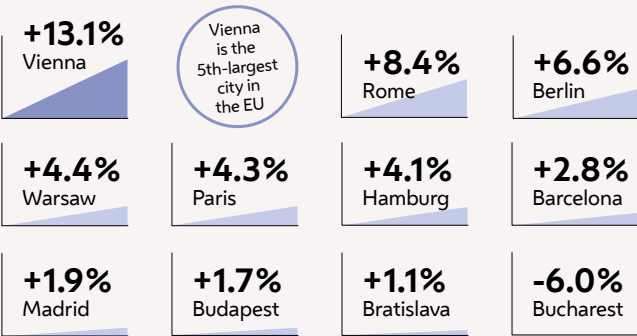
Net migration by nationality

Over the past decade, Vienna has seen the highest growth compared with the ten largest cities in the EU and Bratislava.

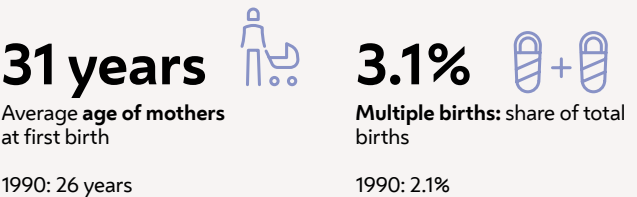

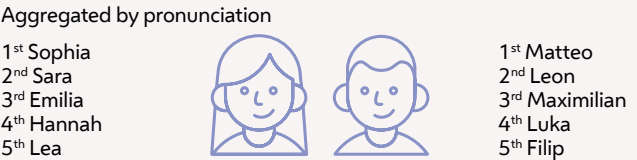

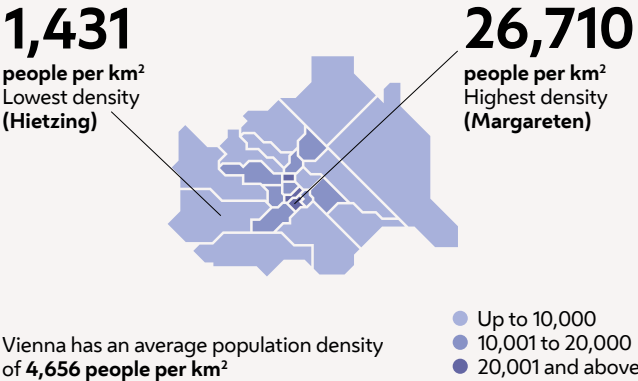

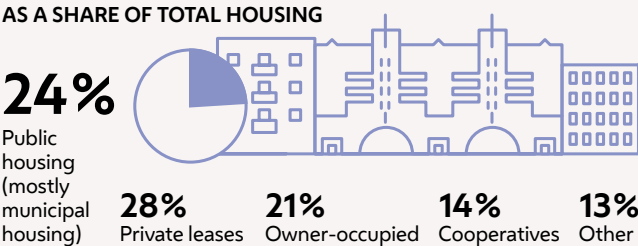

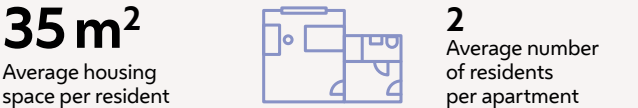
Population density 1 Jan. 2022



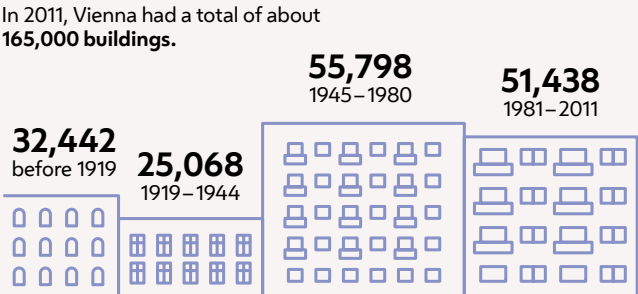
Types of housing 2011

Buildings by construction period 2011



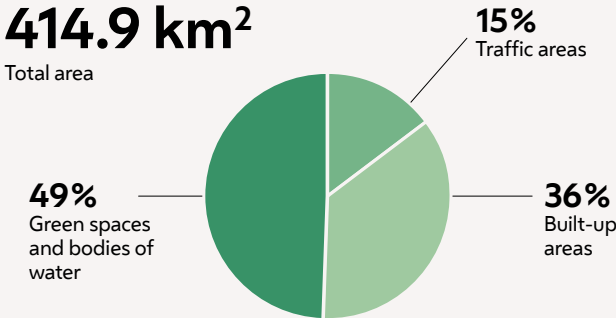

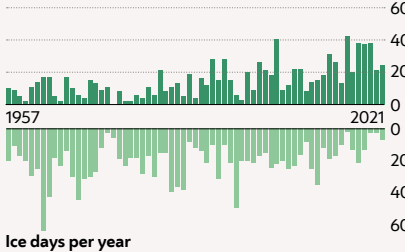

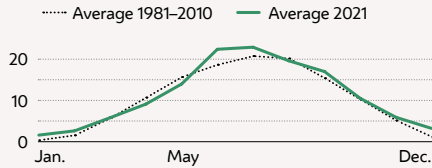

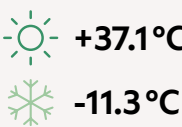

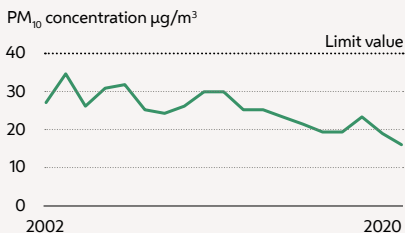

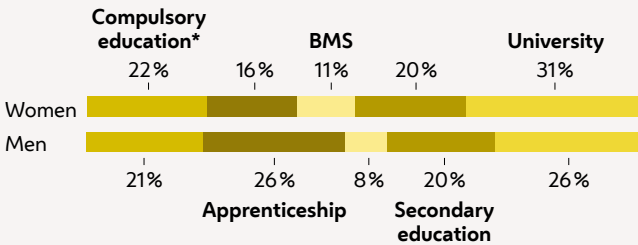

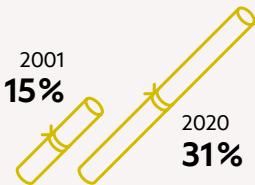

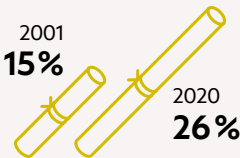

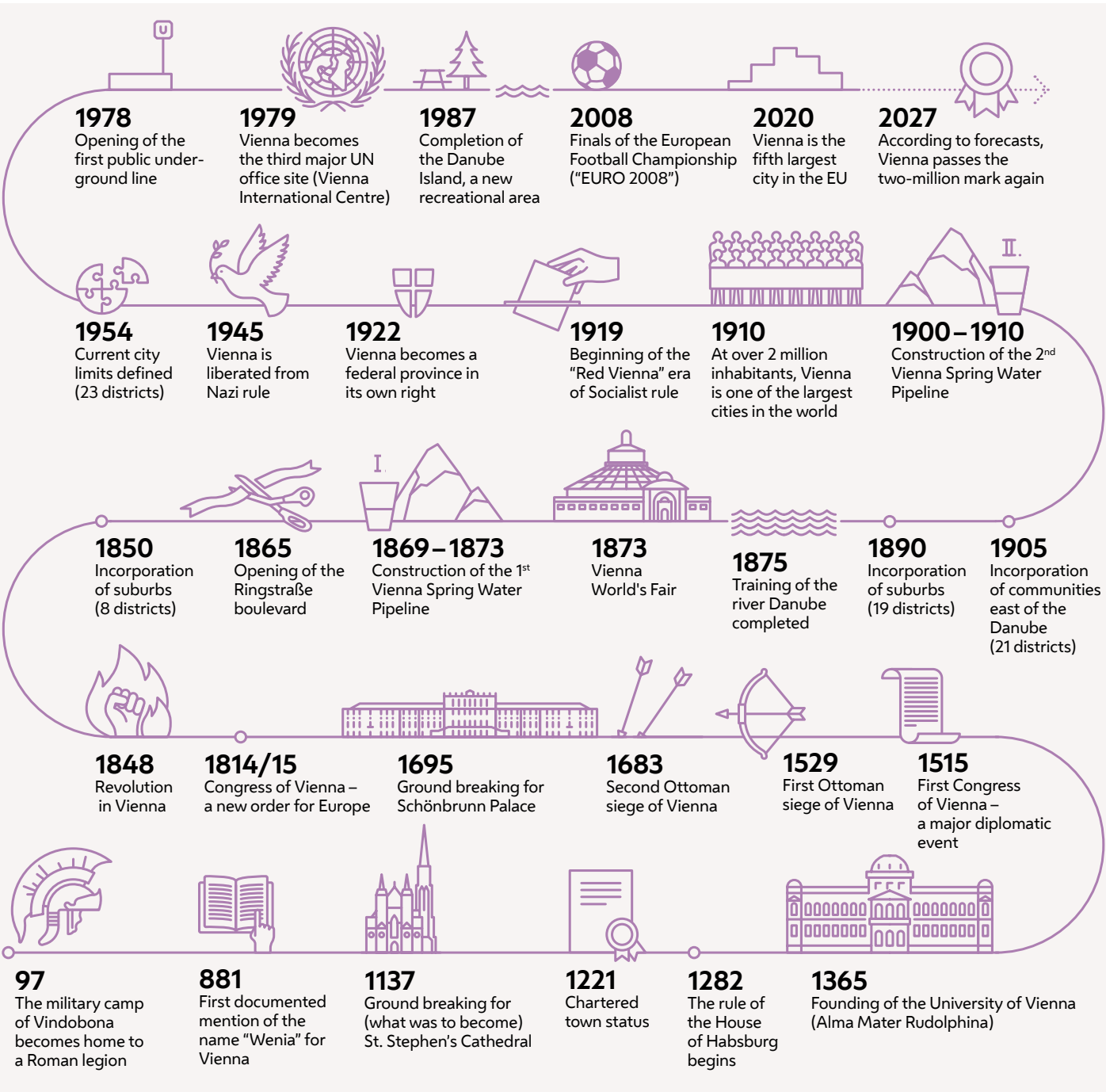

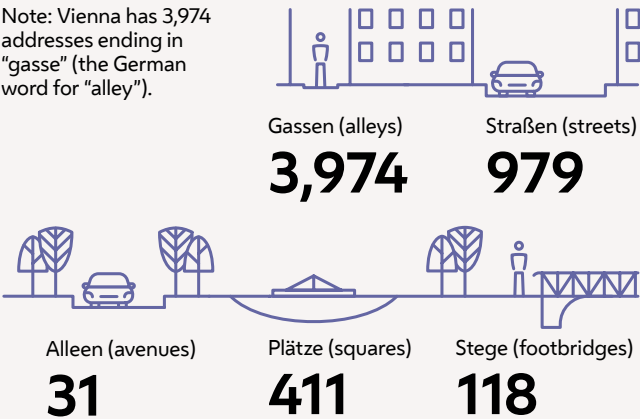
Vienna's shortest and longest streets 2021

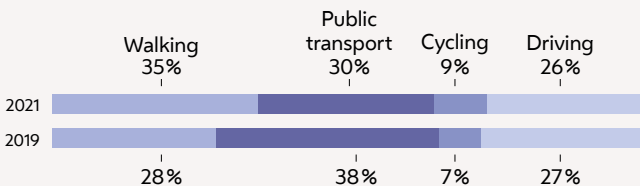

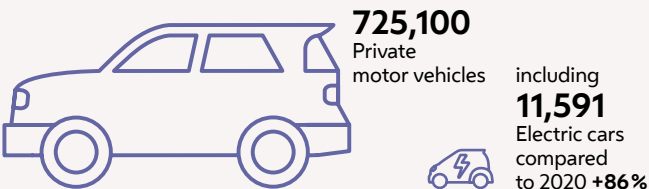

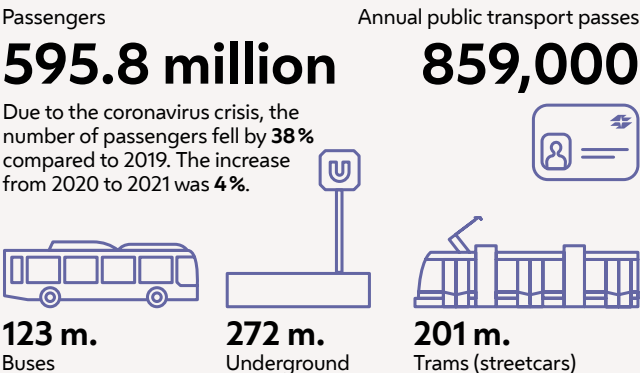

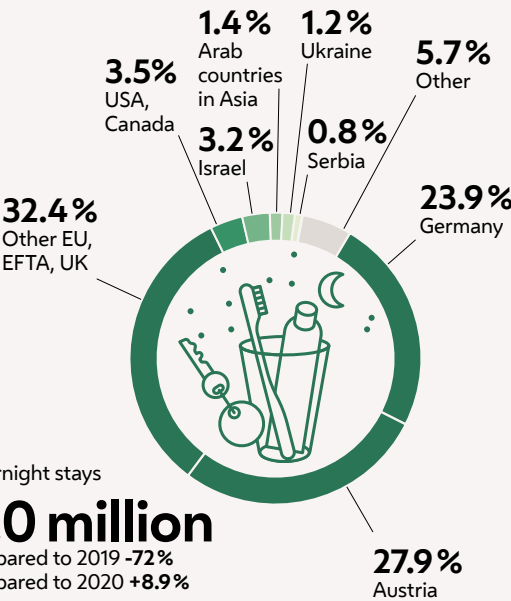

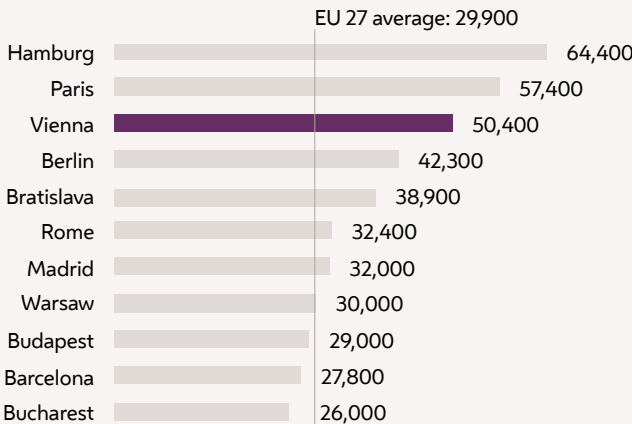

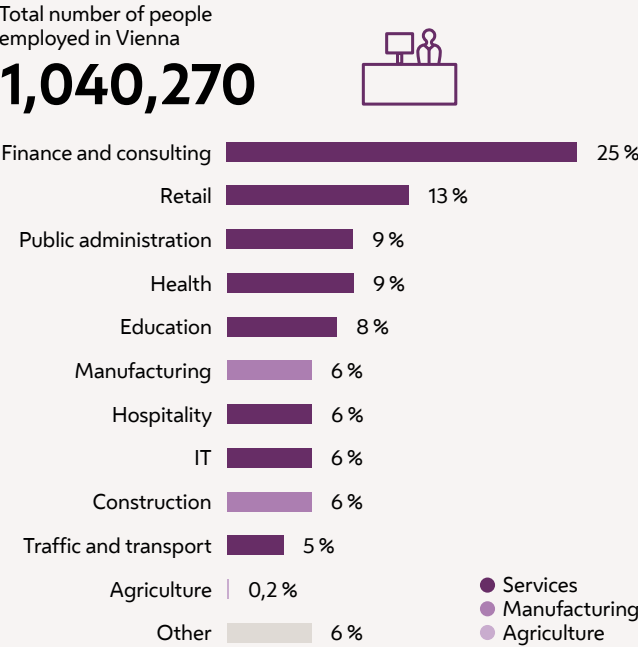

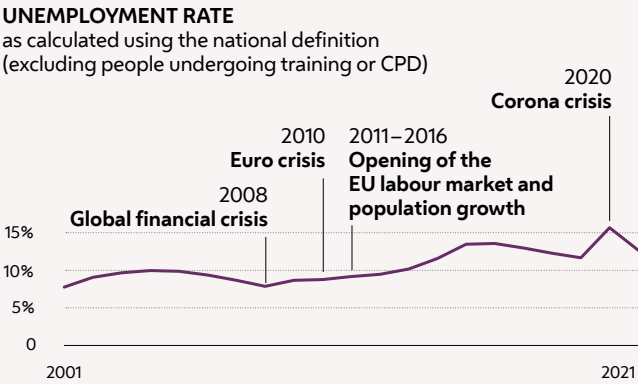

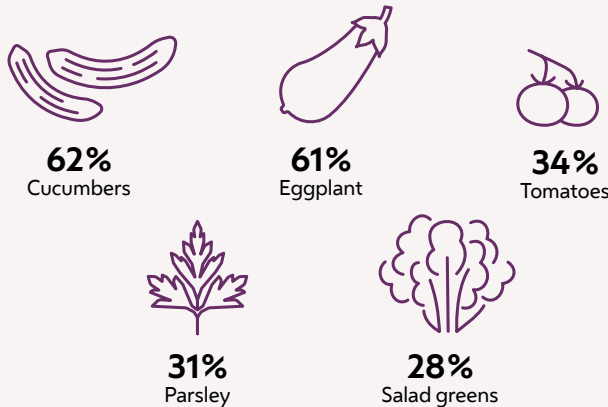

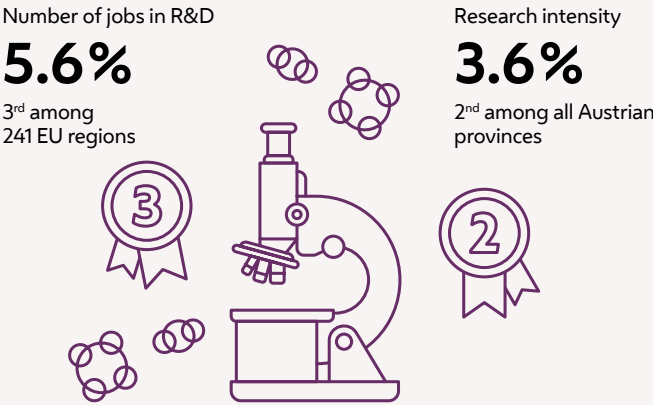

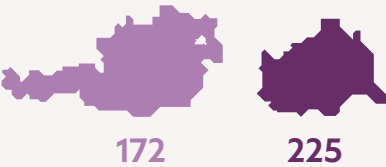

Top 3 countries of origin of new international businesses



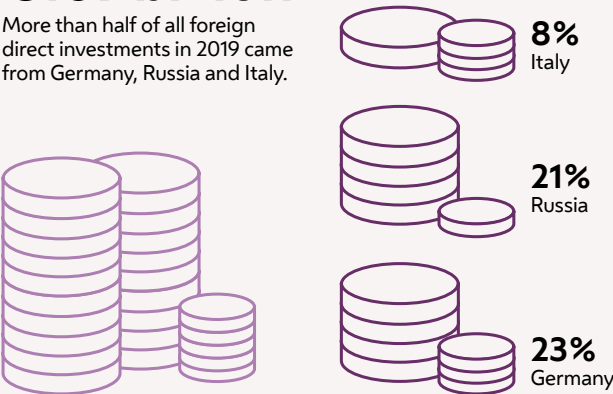

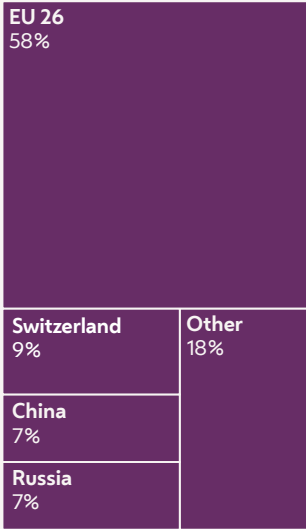

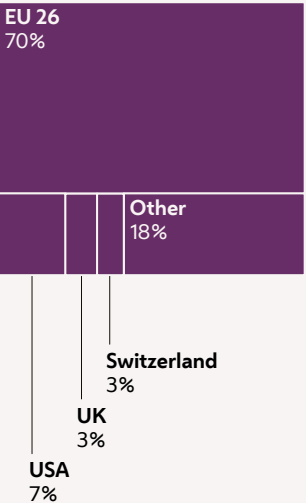

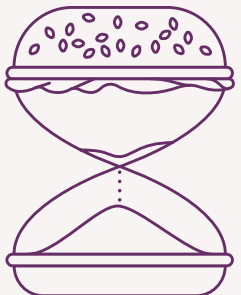

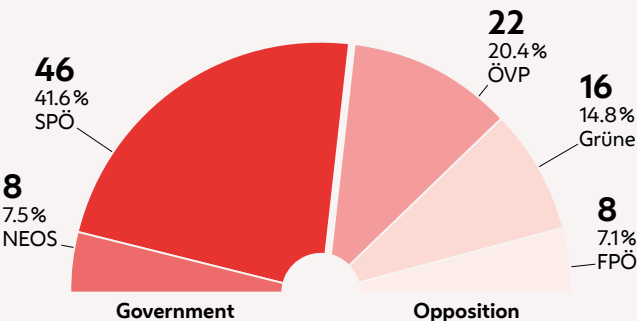

the Vienna City Council and the Provincial Parliament 2020



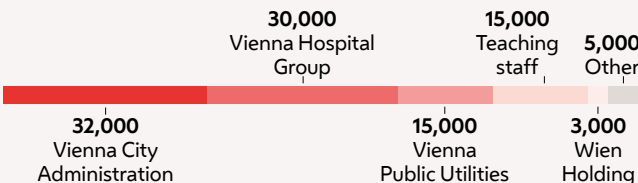

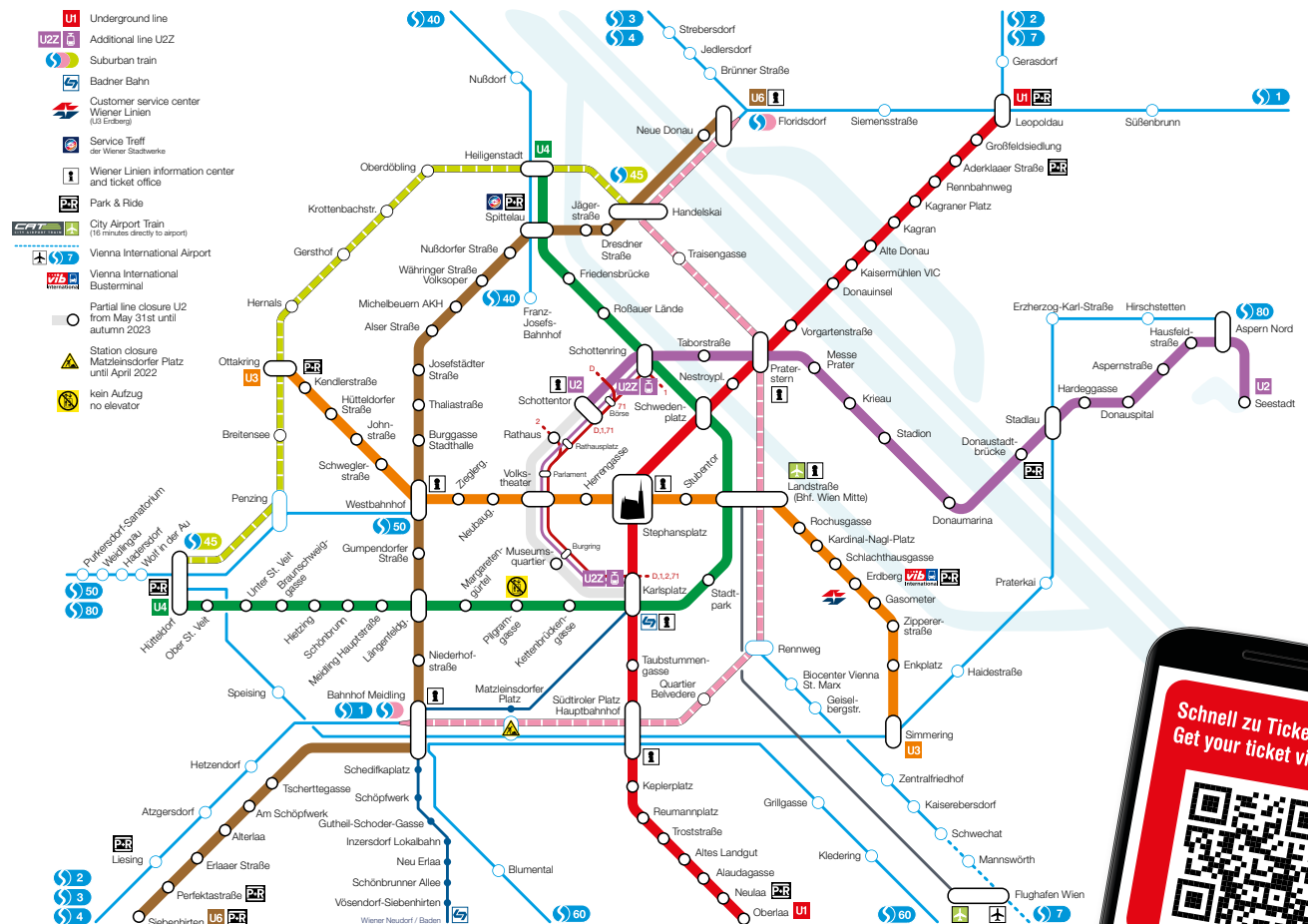
